God's Creation and Our Place in it

St. Ignatius Loyola, the founder of the Jesuit order, recommends in the 20th annotation of his *Spiritual Exercises* that a participant on retreat will “benefit himself the more he separates himself from friends and acquaintances and from all earthly care.”

The Saint stresses that, from this isolation, “three chief benefits, among many others, follow.” The first is that the separation helps to “serve and praise God, our Lord,” and this “merits no little in the sight of his Divine Majesty.”

The second is that, being thus isolated, “and not having his understanding divided on many things, but concentrating his care on one only, namely, on serving his Creator and benefiting his own soul, he uses with greater freedom his natural powers, in seeking with diligence what he so much desires.”

The third chief benefit, he says, is that “the more our soul finds itself alone and isolated, the more apt it makes itself to approach and to reach its Creator and Lord; and the more it so approaches him, the more it disposes itself to receive graces and gifts from his Divine and Sovereign Goodness.”

Pope Francis, a Jesuit, said a good course of spiritual exercises helps those who participate to develop an “unconditional adherence to Christ” and to “understand that prayer is the irreplaceable means of union with him crucified.”

This year is our tenth Men’s Ignatian Retreat. St. Luke’s and St. Raphael’s Council join in sponsoring “God’s Creation and our Place In It,” a silent men’s retreat at Avila Retreat Center, 711 Mason Rd., Durham. It starts Friday (5/19) at 5 PM and closes Sunday (5/21) around noon, so retreatants are home early Sunday afternoon.

As Catholic men faced with family and work challenges in this secular environment -- we need quiet time with Our Living God. In silence, solitude and prayer the Lord will help us to discern His plan for us and for those entrusted to us.

Father Peter Murray, S.J. Parochial Vicar at St. Raphael’s will direct this as he has other retreats over his years as a Jesuit. He will focus this one on: our hearts and God’s creation, sin and its harmful effects, God’s free gift of grace, Jesus’ greatest gift, and our job caring for the earth and its people. All of this to be presented in the context of the Ignatian Spiritual Exercises.

Knight of the Year - 2017

Our Council's Knight of the Year candidate is a prime example of a humble Catholic gentlemen who serves his Council, his Church, and his community.

Brother Keith Kosinski is a 3rd degree Knight and current Treasurer of our Council. He regularly attends and provides additional leadership to officer's meetings and business meetings. He participates in Council activities, such as our fundraiser dances, cook outs, youth recognition events, Operation LAMB and weekly volunteer service at Catholic Parish Outreach. He also coordinates all Council activity that requires use of church facilities.

In recent years Keith has become our pastor's right hand man, serving him through various capacities in and out of the Council. Our parish church building was destroyed by a fire in 2014. For two years, the parish and diocese (along with the insurance company) evaluated options to repair or rebuild the sanctuary. The eventual decision was made to tear down the existing structure and rebuild an entirely new church building. Brother Keith was instrumental in assisting our pastor and coordinating the design, fundraising and construction of the new church. Throughout this time, our brother's involvement included:

- 6 years on Parish Pastoral Council - current chairman
- Previous member and chairman of Parish Finance Council
- Current and prior three years as chairman of Bishops Annual Appeal at our parish
- Current member of Raleigh Diocese Building and Real Estate Commission
- Member of Parish Stewardship Committee

The new church building construction is well underway and will be dedicated on October 21, 2017. This would not be possible without many peoples' efforts, sacrifices, generosity and prayers. Keith is one of those key contributors to this success. In addition to the above contributions and volunteering weekly at the Catholic Parish Outreach food pantry, this brother continues to serve the community by also helping to coordinate parish-wide food drives to inspire service from fellow parishioners.

We are grateful to call Keith Kosinski one of our Brothers and one of our friends at St Luke's Council 12455 in Raleigh, NC. He truly exemplifies the principles of the Order and deserves to be honored as the NC Knight of the Year.



Before coming to St. Raphael’s last year, Father was stationed in upstate New York area -- primarily doing pastoral work in parishes, schools, hospitals, prisons, and leading Ignatian retreats. Father Peter previously directed the Shrine of the Jesuit Martyrs in Auriesville, New York, working with pilgrims and retreatants, and fostering the devotion to the Jesuit Martyrs and St. Kateri Tekakwitha. As retreat director, Father Peter will lead, explain and draw on the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius of Loyola. Mass is scheduled on Sunday. Familiar devotions, brief talks, personal prayer -- and general retreat silence -- will augment the prayerful solitude of the weekend. There will be ample time for prayer, reflection, meditation, and an optional personal conference or confession with Fr. Peter. Past retreatants attest to the value of this Ignatian spiritual experience -- as their relation with the Lord was strengthened and deepened.
