Rob at the rally and downtown walk were several Brothers and about 10 Carpe Diem and Vita Nova youth with Stephanie Jones, Director of Faith Formation and Youth Min-

The Raleigh march seemed smaller than some in the past, possibly attributable to Love my Life youth rally discontinuance and iffy weather.

# Chrism Mass —Need Brothers to Help — Tim Nichols

For the last few years, our Council has led the effort to support the annual Diocesan Chrism Mass. We have received a state award for this worthy effort.

The Chrism Mass is celebrated annually in every diocese and is one of the most solemn and important liturgies of the liturgical year. This year the Charism Mass will take place at the Holy Name of Jesus Cathedral on April 16. During the Mass, the Bishop will bless the Oil of the Catechumens, the Oil of the Sick and consecrates the Sacred Chrism.

The Chrism Mass also celebrates the ministry of the priests. They are invited to renew their commitment of service and are given the prayers and support of the people of the Diocese, represented in the faithful who have gathered for the Mass.

After the Rite of the Blessing of the Oils and Consecration of the Chrism the Holy Oils are taken to a room where volunteers prepare smaller bottles packaged into individual boxes. The box of Holy Oils containing one of each is then returned for the Distribution of the Holy Oils and the Sacred Chrism. It is during this

time that the Vicar General calls forth the parishes, campus ministries, missions, stations and military bases located in the Dioceses.

The St. Luke's Council has had a key role in this challenging and sometimes hectic effort. We have at least 12 Knights who are ready, willing and able to do this.

Brother Tim Nichols is coordinating this this sacred effort, and he invites you to join in this worthy and honorable assignment. How about you? Just let Tim Nichols know!

# Msgr. Quinn: A Priest and Knight — Fr. Rob Staley

Brothers, this is one of the most inspirational articles I have ever read on the Knights of Columbus website and I wanted to share with you. Blessings, Fr. Rob

Decades before Martin Luther King, Jr. would begin advocating for civil rights, Knight of Columbus member, Msgr. Bernard Quinn fought for the dignity and rights of African-Americans during the rise of nativism and racism led by the Ku Klux Klan in the 1920s.

Msgr. Quinn knew it was his duty as a Knight to fight against racial discrimination since the organization has always been a fierce opponent of the Ku Klux Klan. The fight included legal battles to defend the rights of minorities as well as the **commission** of books that promoted racial equality, with one by civil rights proponent W.E.B. DuBois. When the Klan took to acts of violence, Knights **responded** by protecting priests, Catholics and other Knights from the Klan's angry mob.

In 1928, Msgr. Quinn and the Klan had their own conflict. After he founded the orphanage "The Little Flower House of Providence" for African-American children in New York, the Klan set it ablaze. Undeterred, Msgr. Quinn rebuilt it only for the Klan to burn it down again several months later. Still Quinn didn't give up, this time rebuilding the orphanage with concrete and brick. The headline in *The Brooklyn Daily Eagle* read, "New Fireproof Orphanage Will Defy Incendiary."

He also founded St. Peter Claver Church, the first parish established for Black Catholics in the Diocese of Brooklyn. In a <u>letter</u> to his parishioners, he wrote, "I would willingly shed to the last drop my life's blood" for each one of them, regardless of their race.

Msgr. Quinn was born to Irish immigrant parents in Newark, N.J., on January 15, 1888, the same day that Martin Luther King, Jr. would be born decades later. Early in his priesthood, Msgr. Quinn approached Bishop Charles Edward McDonnell, with the desire of establishing an "apostolate to Blacks" to

serve the Brooklyn diocese's growing African-American population. These people were coming to New York to flee the Jim Crow laws of the South or were migrating from Caribbean countries.

Msgr. Quinn never got permission for a formal apostolate. Instead, he <u>served</u> in parishes around Long Island and Brooklyn before volunteering as an Army chaplain during World War I. During his time in France, Msgr. Quinn served in racially inclusive Knights of Columbus huts, known for their <u>slogan</u> "Everybody Welcome. Everything Free." Even after surviving a gas attack, Msgr. Quinn stayed in France following the conclusion of the war to tend to the wounded.

Upon his return to the U.S., Msgr. Quinn received several assignments within the Brooklyn diocese before petitioning again to open a church for the African-American population, who were unwelcome in German, Irish and Italian neighborhoods.

"It seems to me that no church can exclude any one and still keep its Christian ideals," Msgr. Quinn <u>said</u>. "The Constitution guarantees the freedom of religion and this, plus the fact that church property is tax exempt, ought to mean that anyone can go any place to worship."

Finally, in 1921, Msgr. Quinn was named rector of St. Peter Claver Church. Before long, 10,000 people of all ethnicities filled the church each week for a popular novena, allowing the ministry to Brooklyn's Black Catholics to expand.

Msgr. Quinn died in 1940 at age 52, and the cause for his <u>canonization</u> was opened in 2008. Throughout his life, he championed African-American rights, emblematic of the Knights of Columbus' mission: Everybody Welcome. Everybody Free.

Also, it was good to see about 40 new Knights at the ceremony.

Our Council continues to attract new members. Joining at the recent 1<sup>st</sup> degree were Brothers Manfred Stenke and Jay Brizendine. In addition, Brother Jim Samborsky is attending our Council under the new eKnight program. Please welcome them all at the next meeting or if you see them at Church.

Each year Council submits a report of our activity for the year. Let me summarize our Annual Survey of Fraternal Activity for calendar 2018 with you. Last year our Council's reported charitable disbursements were: \$6,780 in total including: Church—\$3,500, Culture of Life—\$800, Community—\$2,230, and Family—\$250. Additionally, we raised \$5,159 for Operation Lamb

through two weekend collections at Wal-Mart. This money was donated to benefit the Special Olympics and persons with special needs.

Feeling busy; you should! Council Brothers and their families put in an estimated 22,802 hours of volunteer service. Allocated by activity these are: Church - 10,831, Community – 9,131, Family – 507, Culture of Life – 633, Food for Families - 1,700. Additionally, Operation Lamb – 2 weekends, 32 slots filled over 4 days, about 100 hours.

Starting this new calendar year, we urge that Brothers continue to participate in Council and other service activities. Each should consider working on at least two or three Faith in Action service programs, helping at various community breakfasts, dinners and dances, supporting other church and community activities, and doing at least one shift for Operation Lamb fundraiser. Family members are always welcome.

# **Pray for and Support Vocations**
