## **Life — From Supreme Knight**

My Brother Knights:

After nearly 50 years, the wrong decision that was made in Roe v. Wade has been set right. The Supreme Court's historic decision in Dobbs v. Jackson Women' Health Organization overturning both Roe and Planned Parenthood v. Casey, is a watershed moment in the movement that generations of Knights of Columbus have worked and prayed for. Indeed, it is one of the most significant advancements in human rights in our nation's history.

We are grateful and encouraged by the Court's finding that abortion is not a "constitutional right." But we must not think that today is a day to declare victory. Instead, I call upon every member of the Knights of Columbus to redouble their personal efforts to build up the Culture of Life that St. John Paul II described in his prophetic encyclical letter Evangelium Vitae.

With Roe reversed, federal advocacy to protect unborn life is still necessary, but the decision opens wide the doors for states to consider their own abortion laws as well. Many states have laws that immediately protect unborn human life. Others have taken regrettable steps to make themselves "sanctuaries" for abortion-on-demand. Pregnancy resources centers will become even more vital as they reach out to serve pregnant women, new mothers and their children.

In the months and years ahead, Knights should work to support — or start — marches for life in every state. Another critical action we can all take is to increase our support for pregnancy resource centers in our communities. To that end, the Supreme Council has announced a \$5 million campaign to support new mothers and their children through a new program: ASAP (Aid and Support After Pregnancy). These pregnancy centers and maternity homes are now the front lines of the pro-life movement, and Knights should continue to stand and serve with them. You can support this effort by making a donation today. (Italics added in this Newsletter)

Even before the Dobbs decision was officially released, we saw numerous instances of violence and vandalism targeted at pregnancy resource centers and Catholic churches across the country. Let us find our response in the words Pope Francis addressed to the 2021 Supreme Convention, which called on us to be men "committed to building up rather than tearing down, promoting healing and reconciliation in place of hatred and recrimination, and inviting all to undertake the 'journey of fraternity' that can lead to a world ever more in accord with God's saving plan for our human family."

Finally, we must continue to pray and fast for the end of abortion. How fitting it is that the *Dobbs* decision arrived on the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Let us pray in thanksgiving for this decision, and continue to implore the intercession of Our Lady of Guadalupe as we work to build a Culture of Life in which every human life, made in the image and likeness of God, is welcomed in life and protected in law.

### **Council Blood Drive**

The first blood drive sponsored by the Knights of Columbus Council 12455 at St. Luke the Evangelist Catholic Church took place on Friday May 13. We initially met 25% of our goal by past donors of prior St. Luke's blood drives.

Walk-ins drawn in from the road signs and local non-parishioners edged the Council closer to the goal even after 5 do-

nors had to be turned away for poor iron. It was the Knights attendance and participation in the event that brought us to our goal of 25 products collected.

Seventeen pints of whole blood were collected, and 4 "Power Red" donors — A Power Red donation collects the red cells but returns most of the plasma and platelets to the donor. These donors must meet specific eligibility requirements. Power Red results in 2 blood products each collected resulting in 8 donations.

Coffee and donuts were donated by Daylight Donuts on Creedmoor Rd for after the procedure. Thanks to Brother Bob Morrow for leading and coordinating this community project. We are sorry to learn that Bob is laving us for a new home in Florida. Bob will be sorely missed. We anticipate that another Brother will step up and become the Blood Drive Chairman. ### St Luke's Stained Glass Window Reflection — Ken Low

Council 12455 Knights have offered reflections for eight of the 17 stained-glass windows in St. Luke's church. Brothers and other parishioners are encouraged to write and share the joy of St. Luke's parables depicted in our beautiful church's stained glass widows. You can preview these reflections on the St. Luke's website. Below is Brother Ken Low's thoughts on The Parable of the Good Samaritan.

### St. Luke, Chapter 10 verses 29-37

The Parable of the Good Samaritan begins with a question posed to Jesus, "Teacher, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?" Indeed, this is the central question for every Christian today as well! The ultimate answer: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself."

In answer to the follow-up question posed to Jesus "And who is my neighbor?"—Jesus responds with the familiar Parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:29-37). A man, presumably a Jew, was stripped, beaten and left for dead along the roadside. As they passed by him, two Jewish "holy men" each chose not to aid the man as he lay there beaten and bleeding. Then a Samaritan (a people despised by Jews) came by, "had compassion," bound the wounds, took the injured man to an inn and tended his injuries that night. In the morning, he paid the bill, asked the innkeeper to take care of the man and promised to pay him for his efforts on his return!

Reflecting, we will perceive that Jesus has woven numerous lessons into this parable...perhaps the most important being that every person is our neighbor, even those whom we may not particularly like, who are ungrateful and even our enemies. We, as His followers, are called to love them "as yourself." Jesus is telling us that we are to be an extension of God's unconditional love to our neighbors!

As Fr. Gabriel of St. Mary Magdalen, O.C.D. puts it, "God creates creatures, not because He has need of them, for they can add nothing to his beatitude and essential glory; but He creates them solely to extend His infinite goodness outside Himself...This goodness is the cause of your being and your life..." \*

If we are going to love our neighbor, we need to understand what real love looks like. Unfortunately, our society has seriously warped many peoples' perceptions of what love is. In the Bible, however, 1 Cor 13:4-8 describes it beautifully: "Love is patient and kind; love is not jealous or boastful; it

is not arrogant or rude. Love does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrong but, rejoices in the right. Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends." This is just in times of crisis, and He gives many, many opportunities each day: Being patient with our children or spouse; greeting the checkout clerk by name with a cheerful smile; thanking people for doing the things that we have just come to expect; letting the other person be right most of the time; choosing not to hold a grudge; not judging someone, not cursing the person who cut you off in traffic, and on and on. Just look at 1 Corinthians. The outline is there for us! Reflect on it at the end of each day. How have you loved your neighbor today? What opportunities did you fail to take? Think about it...the reward is "eternal life"!

### **Council Officer Duties**

### **Grand Knight**

The Grand Knight is responsible for the welfare of the council. He presides over council meetings, acts as ex-officio member of all committees, appoints a membership and program director, convenes officers for a monthly meeting, and ensures all necessary reports are submitted to the state and Supreme Council. He should also be aware of the council's financial status and ensure that his signature appears on all checks drawn. For more specific duties and responsibilities, refer to the Grand Knights Handbook (#915).

### **Deputy Grand Knight**

The deputy grand knight is second in command. He assists the grand knight with council affairs and fulfills all duties assigned to him by the grand knight. Should the grand knight be absent from a council meeting, the deputy grand knight will preside. He is chairman of the council's retention committee.

The chaplain is the spiritual advisor of the council. He is expected to make a report at council meetings on religious matters. The grand knight appoints a priest in accordance with any rules established by the bishop of the diocese to serve as council chaplain. For more specific duties, responsibilities and eligibility, refer to the Chaplain's Handbook (#945).

#### Chancellor

The chancellor has a variety of responsibilities. Primarily, he assists the grand knight and the deputy grand knight in the execution of their duties and oversees the council in both their absences. He is charged with strengthening the member's interests in council activities. The chancellor is chairman of the admission committee...

#### Recorder

The recorder is similar to a court reporter or a secretary. He is responsible for maintaining a true record of all actions of the council and it's correspondence.

### **Financial Secretary**

The Supreme Knight, upon recommendation of the council appoints the financial secretary. His main area of responsibility is maintaining all financial and membership records. He collects and receives all moneys from all resources, including annual dues from council members. He also handles supply orders for the council officers and members, filing the Report of Officer (#185), and submitting all membership transactions to the Supreme Council. For more specific duties and responsibilities, refer to the Financial Secretary Handbook (#1410).

#### **Treasurer**

The treasurer is responsible for the safekeeping and maintaining records of all council funds and accounts. He is responsible for depositing money into the council's accounts and provides a certificate of such monies to the grand knight. He is also responsible for payment of all expenses.

### **Advocate**

The advocate is the legal representative of the council and serves as the council's attorney at trials and investigations of any interest to the council. While he does not need to be member of the legal profession, he should be familiar with the council by-laws, the Order's Charter, Constitution and Laws (#30), Methods of Conducting a Council Meeting (#1937) and Robert's Rules of Order.

#### Warden

The warden is the "watchdog" for council property and degree paraphernalia, except the property of the financial secretary, treasurer and recorder. He is also responsible for setting up the council chambers for meetings and ceremonial work. During ceremonial exemplifications, he will appoint and supervise guards.

#### **Inside & Outside Guards**

The guards have similar responsibilities, but distinct differences. The outside guard tends to the outer door admitting visitors and members to the inner door. Once at the inner door, the inside guard checks to make sure that their membership cards are current.

#### Trustees

The board of trustees consists of three members elected by the council, They and the grand knight, who serves as chairman, comprise the board of trustees. They oversee the work of the financial secretary and treasurer. The board of trustees and the deputy grand knight serve on the councils retention committee. During council elections, only the three year trustee is voted on, with the others moving on to become two-vear and one-year trustees respectively.

### **Exemplification to Knighthood in the Third Degree.**

Many Brother Knights have neither observed nor participated in The new K of C Exemplification Process. If so please join us on the evening of Wednesday July 27 for this beautiful and meaningful articulation of Knighthood.

Why may you wish to do this?

First, this is opportunity to inform and possibly involve spouse and family in the faith, family, community and life ministries of the Knight of Columbus. The new exemplification emphasizes family engagement in our faith in action projects.

Second, the Exemplification imparts first, second and third degrees of Knighthood. If your are not yet a third degree Knight your participation will bring you into full kinghood in the third degree, affording eligibility for various council offices (see previous page) or state officer opportunities, and, should you wish, to advance to the fourth degree —the patriotic degree of Knighthood.

The new Exemplification ceremony takes about one half hour, and, based on our past experience, your invited families will appreciate the informative ceremony and the opportunity to observe. A brief reception will be afterwards in St. Luke's hall area.

The ceremony begins with the Chaplain opening prayer, followed by four presentations: the Presiding Officer, Charity, Unity and Fraternity speakers, The installation is conducted by the Warden and Installing Officer and concludes with the Chaplain's prayer and with final comments by the GK or a K of C state official.

A very concise, meaningful and significant presentation! Again Brother families are invited and encouraged to attend. Presentations are short and to the point. Should First and Second Degree Brothers attend and participate they will achieve Third Degree Status. Join us July 27, 7:30 PM
